HUMBOLDT	As you likely know, the CSU and our universities have fallen short in our prior efforts to repatriate Native American ancestors and cultural items in a timely manner. A recent report from the California State Auditor clearly detailed how the Chancellor's Office has failed to provide the guidance and oversight necessary to ensure that the CSU's campuses prioritize NAGPRA and CalNAGPRA – and that

MARITIME ACADEMY	a systemwide policy is needed. It is clear to me and the Board of Trustees that the CSU must act immediately to correct course and prioritize timely, authentic and

POMONA	AB 389 also requires the CSU to create systemwide NAGPRA/ CalNAGPRA policies and procedures. The law requires consultation and collaboration with
